<p>(20 minutes)</p> <p>Listen to the story of The Three Billy Goats Gruff and talk about what happens.</p> <p>Using objects from around the home, You can use any toys as the goats and the troll. You could make a bridge from boxes or cushions.</p> <p>Retell the story using repeating phrases eg “ Trip-Trapping over my bridge”.</p>	<p>(20 minutes)</p> <p>Referring to the book Who Loves Carrots? Provide your child with paper or card, pens, pencils or felt tip pens and ask them to mark make about foods that they like or dislike.</p> <p>Using the book What Colours Do You Eat? talk about what colours we could use for our mark making. If they draw a purple banana, this is ok as they are still exploring.</p>	<p>(20 minutes)</p> <p>Watch the videos below and sing along to them with your child. Show your child how you are using your fingers to show the numbers in the song.</p> <p>5 Little Ducks</p> <p>5 Little Men in a Flying Saucer</p> <p>Collect different small objects from around the home eg, bottle tops, beans, pasta, buttons etc. Start with “zero” and count up to five objects at first. Make sure your child touches each object and says the number</p>



Can you act the story with your child? Take turns with your child to be a goat or the troll. Take a photo of your child's scary troll face!

Take another look at the book [Who Loves Carrots?](#). Talk about how the Three Billy Goats like to eat grass in the story and in this book they also like carrots. Ask your child about food they like and dislike.

How can I help my child?

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Encourage children to take the lead when retelling the story.

Join in the story with your child, repeating phrases.

If the child can not recall all the events from the story praise them on the parts they do remember.

Model sentences to your child, "I like to eat carrots because they are crunchy".

Try not to paint or draw for your child. Ask them about the marks they make.

At this age, children's drawings are not clear and they may just make lines and some shapes like this.



That's fine! Praise your child and ask them to tell you about their marks.

When they are in Nursery, children are still developing their pencil grip. Don't worry if your child uses a pen or pencil like this child.



Help your child practise showing the different numbers to 5 on their fingers. Children may find this a little tricky at first because they are still developing their finger strength.

Touch each object as you count and say one number name as you touch each object. Children in Nursery are beginning to learn the number names so don't worry if they forget the order!

	As their fingers get stronger, they will be able to hold a pen or pencil between them. Show them how, but don't make them -- that might put them off writing!

Every day, encourage your child to select and play with the toys they choose for at least 2 hours, play alongside them and comment on what they are doing "the car is going over the bridge"

Play with your child but let them be in charge of the play.
