<p><b>Wednesday</b> Design a book cover for the Roman myth <a href="#">Romulus and Remus</a>. Write a blurb that summarises the story.</p>	<p><b>Wednesday</b> Log on to <a href="#">Sumdog Spelling</a> to earn points for practising tricky spellings!</p>
<p><b>Thursday</b> Listen to <a href="#">this story</a> about the origins of Chinese New Year. Summarise the main events by drawing a comic strip. What was the animal the year that you were born?</p>	<p><b>Thursday</b> Choose 5 <a href="#">Common Exception</a> words. Practise spelling them, then try and write sentences using each word. If you are unsure of the word's meaning, use <a href="#">a dictionary</a> before writing your sentence.</p>
<p><b>Friday</b> Visit <a href="#">Read Theory</a> and try a range of different comprehension activities.</p>	<p><b>Friday</b> List adjectives and place names that begin with the same letter e.g. <i>fascinating France, sweltering Sri Lanka, exquisite England</i>. Are there countries for each letter of the alphabet?</p>

If you finish, have another go and try to beat your score!</p>
<p><b>Thursday-</b> Listen to some <a href="#">Anasi stories</a>. Write your own story featuring Anasi. What will the moral of the story be?</p>	<p><b>Thursday</b> Visit <a href="#">this website</a> and challenge yourself and your family to a game of Countdown!</p>
<p><b>Friday</b> Create an information report on your chosen country from this week's reading tasks. Organise your writing into paragraphs. You could use subheadings such as: <i>Location</i>, <i>Culture</i>, and <i>Cuisine</i>.</p>	<p><b>Friday</b> Explore different <a href="#">currencies</a> used around the world. ## Learning Project - to be done throughout the week

The project this week aims to provide opportunities for your child to learn more about countries and cities around the world.

- **Let's Wonder** - Explore a continent of your choice. Create a continent fact file, or choose a particular country and create an information guide including the weather, tourist locations, landmarks, weather, traditional music, food, flags.
- **Let's Explore** - Look at [flags of the world](#), and choose different countries to 'visit'. Are they in another [time zone](#)? What [time is it in the countries](#) you have chosen?
- **Let's Create** - Create a flag for the country that you created this week. Use this [guide to flags](#) to help you think about the symbols and colours you would like to use to represent the country you have created.
- **Let's Get Active** - Challenge yourself to learn a traditional Brazilian party dance - [the Samba!](#) You could film yourself doing the samba, then watch it back to evaluate and improve your dance. Get active with [the Body Coach](#), who is streaming P.E. classes online every day at 9am! **Recommendation at least 2 hours of exercise a week.**
- **Let's Talk** - Talk to your family about the links you have to other countries. This could be where your family lives, where you have enjoyed going on holiday, or countries you would like to visit in the future. Try learning greetings in different languages using [this song](#).
- **Let's Reflect** - Watch [this video](#) and read about the importance of [Aboriginal art](#). Think about the nature near your home. Consider creating your own Aboriginal-style artwork of an animal or plant that represents you or our local area.
