Learning Project - to be done throughout the week

The project this week continues to provide opportunities for your child to learn more about famous artists and to create their own pieces of art inspired by a chosen artist.

- <u>Art Gallery Tour-</u> Visit the <u>Tate Modern website</u>. Browse through the artists and their work. Choose one artist whose work interests you. Make a sketch of one of their pieces of art and take notes about the artist.
- <u>Famous Artist Research</u> Following on from yesterday, use the Tate Modern website and the internet to research more about your chosen artist. Create a Google Slides to add images and facts you have found out about your artist.
- <u>Imitating Art -</u> Choose one piece of art from your chosen artist that you are going to copy. Use the Tate Modern website to look closely at the artwork and discover what medium the artist used to create it. Now is your turn to try and replicate it!
- <u>Innovating Art-</u> Using your chosen artist/artwork as inspiration, create your own piece of art in a similar style.
- <u>Personal Art Gallery-</u> Create a presentation using Google Slides to show off your work. Your presentation should include: information about you chose to study; pictures of their famous work; photos of your artwork along with explanations of how you completed your pieces.
