

Listen to Ms Yusuf reading | Went Walking again.



Listen to the story and look at the pictures <u>I Went</u> <u>Walking</u>, pause the video and talk to your child about what they can see.

Parents, you can read the story to your child.

Can you remember who the little boy saw when he went on his walk?

I wonder how he said hello to the animals he met on his walk? Tell your grown up

I wonder how many animals he saw on his walk?

Do you think the animals were following the little boy, just like in the story Rosie's Walk? Tell your grown up

When you go out walking, what do you see? Do you see the same things like in the story or different things? Tell your grown up

Listen to other stories:

Ms Norris reading a story: The Paper Bag Princess.

Which animal did you like from the story? The Dog or the Cat? or maybe you liked a different animal? Tell your grown up.

Using pens, pencils, felt tip pens, paper or card, mark make about which animals you would like to see if you went for a walk?

Ask your child about the marks they have made. As they are telling you about them, write down what they are saying.

What colours can you see in the story? What was your favourite part of the story? What part of the story did you not enjoy? (Tell your grown up)

## Making Playdough

Make some <u>playdough</u> and join in with the P<u>laydough</u> <u>Gym</u> have lots of fun!



When children play with playdough they are actually building up strength in their arms, wrist, hands and fingers. The act of squishing, rolling, flattening, poking, squeezing and pinching, patting and kneading can help your child to develop the muscles needed to to write at a later stage.

Sing some counting songs with Ms Yusuf <u>Two Little Dickie Birds</u>

<u>Five Little Men in a Flying Saucer</u>



Collect different small objects from around the home eg, bottle tops, beans, pasta, buttons etc. Count up to five objects at first. Make sure your child touches each object and says the number when they count.

Help Ms Yusuf count the objects in the plates. Can You Help Me Count?



Next time you go outside for a walk try to count how many cars, buses or houses you can see. Tell your grown up what you can see.

In addition to the above activities, play is very important for your child's learning. Click here for some ideas to help you with this.

Every day, encourage your child to select and play with the toys they choose for at least 2 hours, play alongside them and comment on what they are doing eg "the car is going over the bridge"

Play with your child but let them be in charge of the play.

Use exercise videos like this, to help your child stay active.

At nursery, at the end of each day we follow Monkey Yoga. We use this time to focus on our breathing and reflect on all the fun activities we did at nursery. Limit the time your child spends on electronic devices and always monitor what your child is accessing online.
